June 14th - Flag Day

In the US, Flag Day (more formally, National Flag Day), is celebrated on June 14th. It commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States, which happened on that date by resolution of the Second Continental Congress in 1777.

In 1916, Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day; in August 1949, an Act of Congress established National Flag Day.

Flag Day is not an official federal holiday, though on June 14, 1937, Pennsylvania became the first (and only) US state to celebrate Flag Day as a state holiday.

Title 36 Sec.110 of the US Code is the official statute on Flag Day; however, it is at the President's discretion to proclaim officially the observance.

MIFI

MSFRIC currently has five MiFi or wireless devices with a possibility to expand to seven later. These devices allow patrons to access the internet without restrictions. The MiFi network does not require a username/password. You simply need to stop by the Reference

Desk or ask a librarian for the SSID of the network. Devices have a limited range so you need to let the librarian know which area of the library will be used for study.

The MiFi network is for personal devices only; it is NOT FOR USE ON GOVERNMENT EQUIPMENT.
